Advocacy Summit Overview

The Florida Association of Aging Services Providers and the Florida Council on Aging were the State-wide Sponsors of six Regional Advocacy Summits that reached over 515 Health Professionals in Florida's Aging Network.

Major Topics

The major topics covered were: General Revenue Funding for Aging Services; Medicaid Reform; Volunteer Background Screening and TABOR (Taxpayer's Bill of Rights; also now called "Smart Cap").

Margaret Lynn Duggar emphasized that, "while this discussion focuses on state funding for community-based and in-home services, FCOA strongly supports funding for quality in nursing homes and other long term care programs, too."

AARP Presentation

AARP sent a presenter to each of the six summits. (Tess Canja, Phil Koechlein, Kathy Williamson, Steve Rome, Frank Chicoine and Yolanda Rodriguez) The AARP representatives provided an overview of AARP programs, noting that there are 98 chapters representing 3 million members in Florida. AARP strongly supports community-based and in-home services. AARP has concerns about Medicaid Reform and totally rejects TABOR. (Taxpayer's Bill of Rights — also known as Smart Cap)

Emphasis was presented on the differences between the Consumer Price Index that TABOR is based on and how the state spends its dollars, and the impact that different age groups have on state spending and that TABOR does not take this into account. The representatives then described the devastating affects of TABOR in Colorado and described plans by some key Legislators to place TABOR on the ballot in 2012 or sooner as a constitutional amendment in Florida. AARP offered handouts and DVDs on the topic.



Questions/Comments centered on the following topics:

- a) Importance of the Memory Disorder Clinics, the Brain Bank and other Alzheimer's Disease related issues.
- b) Issues around Managed Care Companies taking over Medicaid. We want the best care for clients, we support Choice for clients in the long term care system, and we want the experience of our network to be recognized and utilized in any Medicaid Reform service delivery. One attendee said, "Legislators know that home and community based services save money. We need to have them say, "I support local service providers."
- c) Caregiver Issues – Caregivers provided over \$40 billion worth of care nationally last year. They are the backbone of long term care services. People need to assume a great deal more personal responsibility. One attendee said that in her Sunday school class, 8 people assist a member with care for her husband, who has Alzheimer's.
- d) Importance of community-based and in-home services.
- e) An elder law attorney spoke to the issue of Personal Services contracts and other spousal issues that involve income and assets that are not countable for Medicaid eligibility.

Who Wins in Medicaid Overhaul?

As the Florida House and Senate transform the \$20 billion Medicaid system, they will create winners and losers.

One winner is easy to predict. The House and Senate both want to put almost all Medicaid beneficiaries into managed-care plans, giving HMOs a flood of new customers.

But numerous other groups will have to wait for the outcome of House and Senate negotiations to find out how they fare. With those talks expected to accelerate after the Passover-Easter break, here are some groups that have a lot at stake:

Disabled people: The House and Senate agree that a mandatory managed-care system should include seniors so frail they qualify for long-term care and a vast majority of other Medicaid beneficiaries --- such as low-income women and children.

But a critical difference is that the House's Medicaid bill, which was approved March 31, also would include people with developmental disabilities, such as autism, cerebral palsy, spina bifida and mental retardation.

Developmental-disability groups have argued they should not be included in the managed-care system. The Senate bill, which is ready for a vote in the full Senate, takes that position. But the House envisions a Medicaid system that would integrate all types of beneficiaries.

Hospitals: Looking to compete with HMOs, hospitals want to form "provider-service networks," a type of locally driven managed-care plan that aims to cut out the insurance middle man.

But hospitals say details of the bills could help determine whether the networks are successful. As an example, HMOs get paid a set amount of money each month to care for their members --- what is known as a capitation rate.

Hospitals, however, want to allow provider-service networks to initially get paid the same way they are now -- putting in medical claims after patients are treated and having Medicaid pay them -- rather than taking the risk of working within a capitation budget. They argue that provider service networks have historically had sicker enrollees, as HMOs avoided them, and they worry that the state's promise of higher premiums for sicker enrollees won't be enough to bridge the gap.

HMOs have argued that all types of managed-care plans should be treated the same.

The House bill would allow such fee-for-service payments for the first three years of a network's operation, but the Senate bill would not.

Medically Needy: Senate leaders want to give the Medically Needy program a less-catchy, less-empathetic new name --- the "Medicaid nonpoverty medical subsidy."

A new name is only a symptom of the huge change the Senate wants to make in the program, which covers people who don't normally qualify for Medicaid but who have extremely costly illnesses that are beyond their means. The Senate would continue providing physician services to people in the Medically Needy program, but would cut off funding for hospital and drug costs.

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The House has adamantly opposed the cuts and is backed by the hospital industry. They argue that Medically Needy recipients will still need expensive treatment, which would force hospitals to provide more uncompensated care.

Trial lawyers and doctors: Across the Capitol this spring, trial lawyers are scrambling to fend off bills that would limit lawsuits against doctors, hospitals, nursing homes and other types of health providers.

The House and Senate Medicaid bills include such limits, but to far-different degrees. Both bills would place new limits on damages in malpractice cases against physicians who treat Medicaid patients.

Senators, however, would go further by shielding nursing homes and other groups, such as developmental-disability service providers, from costly lawsuits. It remains unclear whether lawmakers will include such liability issues in the ultimate Medicaid bill or deal with them in separate measures.

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Background Screening Bill Advances!

On April 14th, the House Judiciary passed out the Background Screening Bill that is critical to the Aging Network – our CCE Lead Agencies, Area Agencies on Aging, Senior Centers, Alzheimer's Providers, and others and especially to our Volunteers and Caregivers!

Seven amendments were adopted – none of them harmful/controversial or jeopardizing our efforts to get this legislation passed. Following the meeting, I spoke with Representative Holder who is personally committed to the passage of HB 7233. Representative Holder expressed his sincere gratitude for our Aging Network Service Providers, our volunteers, and our caregivers for what they do for Florida's seniors!

On April 28th, our bill passed the final vote in the Florida Senate! It contains the exemption (up to 20 hours per month for volunteers) and total exemption from background screening for caregivers who are the spouse or blood relative of the senior being cared for.

On May 4th, Senate Bill 1992 was passed by the House of Representative on a unanimous vote of 106 to 0!

The bill now goes to the Governor for signature to become law.

Affordable Care Act: Opportunities for the Aging Network



Partnership for Patients: Better Care, Lower Costs

On April 12, 2011 Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius, joined by leaders of major hospitals, employers, health plans, physicians, nurses, and patient advocates, announced a new national partnership that will help save 60,000 lives by stopping millions of preventable injuries and complications in patient care over the next three years. The *Partnership for Patients: Better Care, Lower Costs* has the potential to save up to \$35 billion, including up to \$10 billion for Medicare.

To launch this initiative, \$500 million in new Affordable Care Act funding was made available through the Community-based Care Transitions Program and up to \$500 million more will be dedicated from the Innovation Center for new demonstrations related to reducing hospital-acquired conditions. The funding will be invested in reforms that help achieve two shared goals:

Keep hospital patients from getting injured or sicker. By the end of 2013, to decrease preventable hospital-acquired conditions by 40 percent compared to 2010. Achieving this goal would mean approximately 1.8 million fewer injuries to patients, with more than 60,000 lives saved over the next three years.


Help patients heal without complication. By the end of 2013, to decrease preventable complications during a transition from one care setting to another, so that all readmissions would be reduced by 20 percent compared to 2010. Achieving this goal would mean more than 1.6 million patients will recover from illness without suffering a preventable complication requiring re-hospitalization within 30 days of discharge.

The \$500 million of funding to community-based organizations partnering with eligible hospitals will be used to help patients safely transition between settings of care. Community-based organizations and acute care hospitals that partner with community-based organizations can begin submitting applications for this funding today. Applications are being accepted on a rolling basis. Awards will be made on an ongoing basis as funding permits.
